# Dear Church of the Holy Cross,

For any construction project, it's critical to know what you are trying to build. The same goes for a church.

So what is God building at Holy Cross? I was fascinated to learn that in 1891 a small group of people laid the foundations for Chapel of the Holy Cross and held the first worship service on July 10, 1892. One hundred and thirty two years later, Holy Cross has changed a lot, but those foundations remain.

That's because the foundation of the church is Jesus Christ. As the Apostle Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 3:10, "According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building upon it. Let each one take care how he builds upon it. For no one can lay a foundation other than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ."

By God's grace, this foundation has been faithfully stewarded at Holy Cross by those who have come before us and, we pray, it will be built upon by those who come after us.

So how do we build on Jesus as our foundation?

The answer is the Gospel. The message of the Gospel shapes our identity, beliefs and methods. Faithfulness to the Gospel is our measure of success, not results. The power of the Gospel transforms our hearts and the world.

That's because the Gospel of Jesus is the gospel of the cross. It is on the cross that God demonstrated his love for us (Romans 5:8). By his blood we can know forgiveness from sin and be made right with God (Isaiah 53:5). We are made new! (2 Corinthians 5:17)

This means we can expect God to do great things in us and through us, but it will come at a cost. Scripture teaches there is no glory, without sacrifice and suffering. It means death to the old self — not our will but His be done. And we are promised that if we suffer with him, we will be

glorified with him (Romans 8:17). That's because the cross always leads to the hope of resurrection life. This is the hope our world desperately needs. The kind of church we all need.

To build such a church is a high calling. It is something only God can do. But how awesome is it that God chooses to build it through us!

As the Lord builds His church it will mean making changes and shifting some priorities, including changes to service times, adjustments to staffing and budgets, and creating Sunday discipleship programs for children, students and adults.

These and other changes will help us to seek him together as one church. To pray, worship and serve as one church. To grow in our knowledge and love of the Lord as one church. And not because it's what we want or what we think will "work," but because we want to build Christ's church and see Him glorified.

As we look back on our history, let's give thanks for our firm foundation in Christ. And as we look ahead, let's seek to be a church built up by the Gospel of Christ.



#### When did you start attending Holy Cross?

I began attending Holy Cross in 1953 when I was born. My Mom was a Sunday school teacher and would bring me to church in a bassinet and to her Sunday School class. I was baptized there in 1953. I started Kindergarten in the old Parish House in 1958.

#### What was Holy Cross like at that time?


I started acolyting in 1962. I could only carry the flags during the procession/recession because you had to be confirmed to carry the cross and serve at Communion, and I wasn't confirmed until 1965 by Bishop Gray Temple. We received church pins if we only missed one Sunday of Sunday School. On Easter Sunday we brought our Mite boxes which were small offertory boxes we used to collect money for charitable purposes that taught us to give to others who were less fortunate. We had an active EYC (Episcopal Youth Community) for grades 6-12. I became the President of the EYC in 1970-1971 when I was a senior in high school. We visited other Episcopal churches where we sang hymns, danced to the latest top 40 songs, and talked about God and the Bible.

What has Holy Cross meant to you in your walk with the Lord?

Holy Cross has always been my home in my walk with the Lord. My Mom and Dad set great examples because they attended every Sunday. Early Sunday school taught us that Jesus Christ died on the Cross for our sins. While that is hard to comprehend as a 7-year-old, it was continually reinforced year after year. We learned much more when we went through confirmation classes in 1965 and it all started to make sense. Sunday School is where I got my foundation... but I am still learning today.

#### How did you see God at work?

I see God at work every day... when you come to him to ask for help, he always answers your prayers... maybe not the way you want... but he answers them. He has helped me out through some difficult times (Freshman year at The Citadel, deaths of parents, sister, close friends). Through Church, I have discovered over the past couple of decades that death has a new meaning for me.... we are just passing through this time on Earth until we have the joy of being with God in eternity!



Holy Cross Ministry Highlights from 2023



#### Daniel Island Music Academy

In January 2023, the Daniel Island (DI) campus launched a music ministry called Holy Cross Music Academy. This ministry was designed to meet the clear need for music lesson offerings in the DI community and to utilize DI worship leader Jake Willis' pre-existing connections as guitar/piano teacher on the island. The ministry, which is now known as Daniel Island Music Academy to avoid confusion following the DI church launch, teaches weekly music lessons on a variety of instruments to students of all ages, six and up (including adults). All of our instructors are Christians who are involved in Holy Cross or another local church as worship leaders and musicians themselves.

This program has built a bridge into our church community for many DI families with no previous connection to us; it has provided a meaningful place to work for a number of local worship musicians; it has also created a unique pathway for discipleship and music ministry involvement for Holy Cross church members of all ages who want to be involved. To highlight what we mean, read the story below of Eliza Dennis' journey in 2023. Her story shows the power for music to help someone grow, not just in craft, but also as a young person, a leader, and a disciple of Jesus. And it is indicative of what we want the long-term vision of Daniel Island Music Academy to be all about.

My journey with the music academy and the DI worship team has helped me to grow in my faith immensely over the past year. The chance to help lead worship music has been an incredibly empowering experience, all while giving me a greater passion for my faith. The experiences I've had with the music school and DI worship team have changed my life, while also being some of the highlights of my year." - Eliza Dennis

Eliza is a high schooler at our church who had previously learned a few instruments and had begun playing flute on occasion with the DI worship team in late 2022. When she enrolled in guitar lessons as the Music Academy launched, she quickly learned to play guitar and sing at the same time. This opened up opportunities for her to play for Music Academy events at Credit One Stadium, New Realm Brewing, Waterfront Park, and more. It also opened up doors for Eliza within the Holy Cross worship team: she went from playing flute once a month to also learning to play bass guitar on Sundays which helped fill a need on the DI team, as well as being able to lead songs vocally, play acoustic guitar, and sing harmonies on Sundays. And all of this is in addition to her also being asked to lead the DI campus youth worship team from guitar and vocals, including leading the youth band rehearsals and preparation for their monthly gatherings.



#### **Honduras Mission Trip**

Since 2009, Church of the Holy Cross has been sending missions teams down to Honduras to serve at the Lamb Children's Home. We have become like family and this past summer, Holy Cross was blessed to be able to send not one, but two teams down to do what families do... love, support, work for and pray for one another. Familiar hugs were given and received as established bonds were strengthened and new ones made.



Over the years our teams have worked on many projects both on and off the property; cement making, weed pulling, house building and hugging on sweet little ones while playing with bigger little ones, just to name a few.

This summer provided our teams opportunity to start and finish several projects as team two slid seamlessly into a few of the projects started by team one. Our teams were welding, making cement (with nothing but some water, sand, a shovel and a lot of muscle), hauling rocks, painting structures, fixing and redesigning a playground, working in the garden and organizing donated goods and clothing, but it wasn't all work. Some of our most precious moments flowed from the special activities we planned for the children at Lamb. There were water balloons, 3-legged races, bucket relays, soccer and many more field day games. We worked hard and we played hard and while our bodies were tired, our spirits were renewed as we shared the week together, helping each other, laughing together, praying and worshipping together and sometimes (many times) crying together.





You come away from these weeks with the sense that this is how it should be; brothers and sisters in Christ, sharing life together as the Holy Spirit hovers close and the Lord strips away your first-world distractions, allowing you to focus only on serving Him. The dictionary defines "family" as "all the descendants of a common ancestor." Our teams left Holy Cross as friends and acquaintances but returned from Honduras as family. The impact of these trips, while surely felt at Lamb, are life changing for those of us at Holy Cross who have answered the call and "followed the Lamb."

#### Annual Men's Turkey Fry







"This year's turkey fry has blessed all of us at Holy Cross ON BOTH CAMPUSES confirming God's work in us and showing us how HE is multiplying his kingdom through us.

One of the ways the men's ministry at Holy Cross serves our community is by having our annual Christmas Eve turkey fry. The 55 or so turkeys we fry each year get sent off to families in the area who need a hot meal at Christmas time. It's truly been such a blessing to me and the men of Holy Cross to be able to fry these turkeys, package them up and give them away at such a needed time of year.

In years past the fry has alternated between Holy Cross' 2 campuses – Daniel Island (DI) and Sullivan's Island (SI). This year, with the impending launch of DI Holy Cross becoming its own church (Church of the Holy Spirit), we decided that we would each have a separate turkey fry. God showed us complete confirmation, through the turkey fry results, that launching Daniel Island to multiply Holy Cross and

Christ's community is the right move. Bobby Cummings was back to organize and lead the men this year at SI.

In years past with men from BOTH campuses present at ONE turkey fry, we cooked an average of 50-55 turkeys. THIS year, the SI campus cooked 63 turkeys without the DI men! The DI men had their turkey fry the next day and cooked an additional 44 turkeys without the SI men! That's 107 turkeys! Praise Jesus! It really feels like a "Sermon on the Mount" moment when Jesus multiplied the 5 loaves and fed thousands and thousands of people. In the same way, Jesus is multiplying our church exponentially right before our eyes.

I am honored to have been a part of the turkey frys for the last many years. This year's growth was explosive. Thank you, Lord! I look forward to celebrating all the multipliers Jesus is performing in our Holy Cross/Holy Spirit community. Don't you just love a good Miracle! "
